

Bishop Erik Pohlmeier Calls for a Just and Hopeful Response to Immigration

February 12, 2025

I am deeply grateful to the Holy Father for his thoughtful letter to the bishops and faithful of the United States (Feb. 11, 2025), acknowledging the major crisis our nation faces regarding immigration. His words remind us that policies built on force rather than truth ultimately fail to uphold human dignity and create division rather than solutions. As Catholics, we are called to respond not with fear but with faith, hope and love.

Our Holy Father encourages us to be mindful of how we speak about and respond to immigration. It is easy in times of uncertainty to rely on strong rhetoric to express concerns about security, stability and lawfulness. Every nation has a duty to protect its people, but we must also recognize that the vast majority of those seeking a better life in the United States are not criminals but families fleeing desperate circumstances.

Immigration enforcement is necessary for our country, as every nation has a duty to uphold the rule of law and ensure security. The U.S. bishops have long recognized this reality, consistently calling for immigration reform that balances enforcement with justice and compassion. A well-regulated system is essential, but it must also respect human dignity and provide clear legal pathways for those seeking a better future. As Catholics, we are called to approach this issue not only as citizens but as disciples of Christ, ensuring that our laws and policies reflect both the need for order and the Gospel's call to welcome the stranger.

The Holy Father has also called for 2025 to be a Jubilee Year of Hope, reminding us that hope is at the heart of our faith. In a time of fear and division, hope compels us to seek solutions rooted in Christ's love. It challenges us to see beyond political divides, recognize the dignity of every person and work for policies that uphold both justice and mercy. Many of our parishioners—faithful Catholics who care deeply about their country—are struggling with concerns about immigration. Others, particularly in our Hispanic communities, are living in fear, uncertain of what the future holds for them and their families. As a church, we recognize these concerns and want to speak directly to you, our brothers and sisters in faith, who feel anxious and afraid. You are not alone. The church is here to support you, walk with you and remind you that hope is stronger than fear.

We have received calls from members of our community who are concerned that Catholic Charities is illegally helping migrants cross the border or failing to uphold U.S. immigration laws. This is simply not true. Catholic Charities and other church ministries provide humanitarian assistance within the confines of U.S. federal law, seeking to uphold the Gospel by offering shelter, food, legal aid and resources to help migrants navigate the proper legal channels. The church does not advocate open borders but for a just and humane immigration system that balances the rule of law with the dignity of every person. The current system often leaves migrants in legal limbo for years, preventing them from fully participating in society. A nation committed to the rule of law must ensure that its laws are just and workable, providing clear legal pathways for those seeking to contribute to our nation.

For decades, the Catholic Church in the United States has played a vital role in resettling refugees and assisting migrants through the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program, a partnership that ensures those fleeing persecution receive thorough vetting, cultural support and an opportunity to rebuild their lives. Since 1980, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has received government funding to carry out this important resettlement work, and Catholic Charities Bureau in the Diocese of St. Augustine has been serving refugees since 1982. Many people do not realize that the refugees we serve are identified and vetted by the U.S. government, a process that has remained consistent across both Democratic and Republican administrations for 45 years.

FROM THE BISHOP'S OFFICE

Catholic Charities is not profiting from this work; rather, it relies on both public and private support to fulfill its mission of serving the vulnerable. Immigration is an issue that stirs strong emotions and concerns, but it also directly affects members of our own parish communities—our true brothers and sisters in faith who now live in fear. As a church, we must acknowledge these realities and offer reassurance to those who are uncertain. The church's mission is not political but pastoral: to provide guidance, support and care to all who need it.

A Just and Humane Immigration System Must Prioritize

The following principles are drawn from "Catholic Elements of Immigration Reform," a document from the U.S. bishops' Department of Migration and Refugee Services. These priorities reflect the church's longstanding commitment to a just and humane immigration system that upholds both security and human dignity:

- Targeted, proportional and humane enforcement Immigration policies should protect national security while respecting human dignity, avoiding excessive detentions and family separations.
- Due process and humanitarian protections Refugees, asylum-seekers and victims of violence must have access to protection and legal pathways to safety.
- A pathway to citizenship for longtime residents Millions of undocumented individuals, including Dreamers and essential workers, contribute to society and deserve the opportunity to seek legal status.
- Family unity as a cornerstone of immigration policy Immigration laws should strengthen families not separate them.
- Expanded and reliable legal pathways A just immigration system must offer accessible and efficient legal channels for those seeking work, safety and family reunification.
- Addressing the root causes of forced migration The church calls for international cooperation to resolve the economic, political and environmental crises driving migration.

An Invitation to Reflect and Act as People of Faith

In the Diocese of St. Augustine, we recognize that immigration is a complex issue that stirs strong emotions, especially in a time of national uncertainty. Many Catholics rightly desire a secure and orderly immigration system, and the church affirms the duty of a nation to protect its citizens. At the same time, our Holy Father calls us to reflect on how we respond to those who are vulnerable and fearful. Are our laws applied with justice and mercy? Are we seeing the human dignity of migrants before we see their legal status? Are we treating families, especially children, in a way that honors our Catholic values?

This is not about political division but about the challenge of living out our faith with authenticity. Pope Francis asks us not to give in to narratives that cause unnecessary suffering. As Catholics, we must bring our faith into



every aspect of our lives, including how we view and speak about immigration. Let us pray for wisdom, for our leaders and for solutions that respect both the rule of law and the dignity of everyone.

The Jubilee Year of Hope calls us to place our trust in Christ and to act with hope that transforms hearts and communities. May we take to heart Christ's words: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35).

May Our Lady of Guadalupe, patroness of the Americas, intercede for all who seek safety and a better future.

Reconciliation

A Jubilee year is a sign of reconciliation because it establishes a "favorable time" (cf. 2 Corinthians 6:2) for conversion. We are called to put God at the center of our lives, growing toward Him and acknowledging His primacy. Even the Biblical call for the restoration of social justice and respect for the earth stems from a theological reality: if God is the creator of the universe, He must be given priority over every reality and partisan interest. It is God who makes this year holy by bestowing on us His own

As Pope Francis recalled in the 2015 Bull proclaiming the Extraordinary Holy Year, "Mercy is not opposed to justice but rather expresses God's way of reaching out to the sinner, offering him a new chance to look at himself, convert, and believe. [...] God's justice is his mercy given to everyone as a grace that flows from the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Thus, the Cross of Christ is God's judgement on all of us and on the whole world, because through it he offers us the certainty of love and new life" (Misericordiae Vultus, 21).



In practical terms, reconciliation involves receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation, taking advantage of this time to rediscover the value of confession, and experiencing God's personal words of forgiveness. There are some Jubilee churches that stay open continuously to make available the sacrament of Reconciliation. You can prepare yourself to receive the sacrament by following a guide.

Prayer

There are many reasons and ways to pray, but at the root of prayer is always the desire to be open to God's presence and His offer of love. It is the Spirit of the Son that calls the Christian community to prayer and allows for each person to return to the Father. It was Jesus who entrusted His disciples with the Lord's Prayer, which is commented on by the Catechism of the Catholic Church (cf. CCC 2759-2865).

The Christian tradition also offers other texts, such as the Hail Mary, that can help to find words to address God: "By a living transmission—Tradition—the Holy Spirit in the Church teaches the children of God to pray" (CCC 2661).

The prayer opportunities on the journey show that the pilgrim holds the path to God "in his heart" (Psalm 83:6). Refreshment is also provided by the various stops and opportunities for rest along the way, which are often organized around shrines, sanctuaries, and other places filled with spiritual significance, where one realizes that — before us and



alongside us — other pilgrims have also passed along and traveled those same roads. Indeed, the paths leading to Rome have often been trod by many saints.

Liturgy

The liturgy is the public prayer of the Church: in the words of the Second Vatican Council, it is the "summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed; [and,] at the same time it is the font from which all her power flows." (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 10). At the center is the Christian liturgy is the Mass - the Eucharistic celebration, where

the Body and Blood of Christ are truly received. As a pilgrim, Christ himself walks alongside the disciples and reveals to them the mysteries of the Father, so that they too can say, like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." (Luke 24:29).

One liturgical rite that is specific to the Jubilee year is the opening of the Holy Door. Until the last century, the Pope would symbolically initiate the demolition of the wall that kept the Holy Door bricked up on non-Jubilee years. Masons would then fully remove the brick wall to be able to open the Holy Door. Since 1950, the ceremony has changed and now the wall is dismantled beforehand and, within a solemn choral liturgy, the Pope pushes open the door from the outside, passing through it as the first pilgrim. This and the other liturgical expressions that accompany the Holy Year emphasize that the Jubilee pilgrimage is not merely an intimate, personal gesture, but is a sign of the journey of the whole people of God toward the Kingdom.
